Founded in 1977, FOCH came into being when a young lady named Caroline Sue Quann

Her friends resolved to honor her wish and as a result, Beaufort's only non-profit hospice came to be. FOCH provides palliative and hospice care as well as providing bereavement and coping support and Camp Caroline for children who have suffered loss.

Palliative care is specialized holistic care for individuals with chronic illness. With hospice care, we focus on caring, not curing the patient who has exhausted all curative treatments. No patient is ever sent a bill. We submit our costs to Medicare, Medicaid and private insurance companies.

With cost reimbursements, grants, fundraisers and donations, we commit to providing the very best care and compassion while giving the patient and their families the peace of mind as the end of life's journey begins. 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## LEGACY TREES BEAUTIFY HABERSHAM

New plantings began shooting up in December in the neighborhood's common areas as a result of the Habersham Tree Team's "Legacy Tree" program, created to supplement the Land Company's replacement program.

Working towards the goal of preserving Habersham's historic tree canopy, the team created a plan - with the approval of the Land Company, the HARB and Neighborhood Association - to help replenish the many native trees lost to construction, age, disease and storms and to create a way for residents to honor special occasions or loved ones by planting a tree... without lifting a finger.

Twenty-one trees were planted in early December including

Eagleston Holly, a Tulip Poplar, Pecan, Red Cedar and several Laurel and Live Oaks. Two were planted to add shade to the playground in honor of two families' grandchildren; another was planted as a tribute to family members who served in the military; one was given as a Christmas gift for a friend; three were planted in memory of family members who passed away; two were

given in honor of friends and several were donated as legacy trees by community residents to beautify Habersham.

"In my career of teaching, ministry, and Hospice work, I have observed a host of ways to

contribute to the environment via legacy plantings. It's a wonderful way to mark a child or grandchild's birth, a graduation, a wedding, a special anniversary, a milestone birthday, a retirement or the passing of a loved one," says Tree Team member Bruce Page.

The Tree Team developed a list of appropriate native trees and mapped out significant gaps in our common areas, perfect spots for tree plantings, all pre-approved by the Land Company. We are working to get 200 trees funded, along with the Land Company, in years to come. Some species are fast-growing. All have a significant life expectancy. Some trees will join the soaring over-canopy; others will bring color and wildlife to the under-story.

Legacy tree prices, \$185-\$395 include everything from taxes to delivery and planting a 45 to 60 gallon container tree. Donors need only write one check. Trees for Fall 2021 can be reserved throughout the year with payment at planting time.

Use your imagination to mark an event. Hundreds of tree openings present a challenge that can be addressed one tree at a time. Plant and grow with us!

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## OLLI IN THE TIME OF COVID WHAT'S HAPPENING FOR WINTER/SPRING 2021?

Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at the USCB campuses responded to COVID-19 last March by transitioning their educational and social opportunities to an online platform.

While some in-person classes moved to later terms, some went online via ZOOM and others were recorded and viewed via YouTube. This online format continued very successfully for summer and fall classes.

Three of the many outstanding classes I took this past fall were BMH CEO Russel Baxley's "COVID-19 A Healthcare Professional Perspective," former Gullah Gullah Island actress Natalie Daise's "Becoming Harriet Tubman," and Special Agent Dana Ridenour's "The Modern FBI" classes.

Although we could not hug or shake anyone's hands as the presenters sat in their offices or empty classrooms and the audience sat in front of their screens, the advantages of being up close and personal with the presenters in the comfort of one's own home

wherever that might be and the ability to easily ask questions made these classes work very well.

With the success of online classes and the continuing uncertainty of when USCB can get OLLI students safely back on campus, the decision was made to continue online learning for the Winter/Spring 2021 semester. Some classes will have an opportunity for an in-person class experience adhering to strict CDC and USCB guidelines, and students can find those classes in the course catalog or online curriculum.

More than 80 classes will be offered for Winter/Spring 2021 semester including bootcamps for using ZOOM and the On-Demand Library. Since there is almost unlimited enrollment, students do not need to worry about a class filling up or where a class will be held and can register for classes any time during the semester.

One class I want to highlight is GOV202: Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway Marine Highway 95 by our own Habersham neighbor Brad Pickel. This will be a repeat of his completely sold-out class from last February.

You can even enjoy OLLI classes on your own time. With On-Demand classes are recorded so OLLI members

can pause, play, fast-forward, rewind, and re-watch a class as much as they would like during the term. Winter/Spring 2021 classes will be added to the On-Demand library as the semester continues.

What do you need to do to sign up for Winter/Spring 2021 semester?

- Logon to the OLLI website [www.ollie.uscb.edu](http://www.ollie.uscb.edu) and click on Register for Classes.
- Make sure your OLLI membership is current. The annual membership is \$40 and includes access to OLLI classes once term fee is paid, the USCB campus library, discounted meals at USCB campus dining halls, discounted tickets to USCB Chamber Music Concerts, discounted USCB Continuing Education classes, and free OLLI summer classes.
- Pay the Winter/Spring 2021 term fee of \$75. There will be no PAYGO option for now. The term fee covers unlimited OLLI courses live on ZOOM, instant access to recorded virtual OLLI classes from the semester for on-demand viewing throughout the term, and one on one technical support and ZOOM tutorials from OLLI staff.
- Once you register, a ZOOM link to each online class will be included with enrollment

confirmation. Students will be able to download their class schedule from the registration website.

Remember you can register at any time during the semester up to class start time.

As a courtesy to OLLI Program Administrators, please email [uscbolli@uscb.edu](mailto:uscbolli@uscb.edu) to cancel a class you cannot attend online (you will still have access to the class once it is added to the on-demand library).

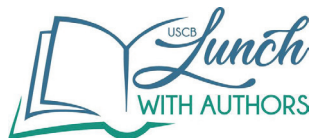

**February 15-19**

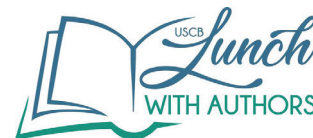

### THE JOY OF STRAWBERRIES

Strawberries are the first fruit to come into season in the Lowcountry. When the strawberry farms open, we flock out to the fields to get our first taste of spring.



Strawberries can be traced back to the Greeks and the Romans. Medieval stonemasons carved strawberry designs on altars and around the tops of pillars in churches and cathedrals, symbolizing perfection and righteousness.

During the same time period strawberries were served at important state occasions and festivals to ensure peace and prosperity. Generations of romantics have recognized the heart-shaped berry as a symbol

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#### STRAWBERRY RUM COCKTAIL

Serves 6

2 cups strawberries, hulled  
½ cup confectioner's sugar  
1/3 cup dark rum  
¼ cup freshly-squeezed lime juice  
Lime zest, for garnish

Process strawberries, sugar, rum and lime juice in a blender until smooth. Pour, in individual servings, into a martini shaker. Add ice and shake for 15 seconds and pour into glass. Garnish with fresh lime zest.

#### CHILLED STRAWBERRY-MINT SOUP

Serves 4

3 cups sliced fresh strawberries  
1½ cups sour cream  
1½ cups heavy cream  
4 tablespoons fresh-squeezed orange juice  
4 tablespoons honey  
3 teaspoons finely chopped fresh mint leaves  
Fresh strawberry slices  
Fresh mint sprigs

Place the strawberries, sour cream, heavy cream, orange juice and honey in a blender or food processor. Process until smooth. Stir in mint. Taste for sweetness; if necessary, add more honey. Refrigerate until well chilled. To serve, pour into chilled soup bowls and top with fresh strawberry slices and mint sprigs.

#### STRAWBERRIES ROMANOFF

Serves 6-8

2 pints ripe strawberries, washed and hulled  
Juice of 1 orange (about ½ cup)  
¼ cup Curacao liqueur  
1 cup heavy cream, chilled  
4 tablespoons confectioner's sugar  
½ teaspoon vanilla extract

Soak the strawberries in the orange juice and liqueur in the refrigerator for an hour or more. Whip the cream until stiff, gradually adding the sugar and vanilla. Spoon the berries into chilled dishes and top with the sweetened whipped cream.

### STRAWBERRY MUFFINS

Serves 12

½ cup butter, softened  
 1½ cups sugar  
 4 eggs  
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
 3 cups all-purpose flour  
 1 teaspoon baking powder  
 ½ teaspoon baking soda  
 ½ teaspoon salt  
 ½ teaspoon finely grated lemon peel  
 1 cup buttermilk  
 1 cup fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced  
 Sugar, for topping

Grease 12 muffin cups or line with paper muffin liners. In a large mixing bowl with an electric mixer, cream butter and sugar; beat in eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Blend in vanilla extract. In a separate bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. With a wooden spoon, stir flour mixture into creamed mixture. Gradually stir in lemon peel and buttermilk until dry ingredients are just moistened. Do not over-mix. Gently fold in strawberries. Spoon batter into prepared pans, filling each muffin cup about 2/3 full. Sprinkle each with sugar. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 18 to 20 minutes. Cool in pan on rack for 5 minutes. Serve warm.

### MESCLUN SALAD AND STRAWBERRIES WITH LEMON-MUSTARD VINAIGRETTE

Serves 6

4 tablespoons lemon juice  
 ¼ cup red wine vinegar  
 ½ teaspoon soy sauce  
 1 tablespoon hot Chinese mustard  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 ½ teaspoon cayenne pepper  
 1 cup vegetable oil  
 7 cups mesclun salad or spring mix  
 ½ cup pine nuts, toasted  
 3 cups fresh strawberries, sliced  
 1 bunch green onions, sliced  
 1/3 cup Romano cheese, freshly grated  
 Black pepper, freshly ground

Combine first 7 ingredients in blender. Mix well. Toss salad greens with pine nuts, strawberries, and green onions. Toss with Lemon-Mustard Vinaigrette and Romano cheese. Top with freshly ground pepper.

Kathy has had one person shows at The Cleveland Museum of Natural History, The Cleveland Play House, Holden Arboretum and The University of South Carolina.

New work was also received by artist, Mark Holland, from Asheville, North Carolina. Holland's Woodland Scenes were so popular at Osprey's Fall Show, the gallery asked Holland to create new works for 2021 specific to the Lowcountry, and what might be seen in Habersham's Riverside Community. These new works include kingfishers, hummingbirds, owls, butterflies,

and nesting wrens as subjects. Holland's magical creations are sized 10" x 10" and up, on 2" wood panel, and provide whimsy and joy no matter where you showcase them. And you better look twice, viewers often miss creatures right in front of their eyes, until someone shows you how to see them.

**Bleary-eyed readers scanning page two of the Boston Morning Post on March 23, 1839, may have barely noticed the linguistic oddity buried in the blizzard of ink in the second column.**

**At the end of a short, throwaway item taking sarcastic jabs at a Providence newspaper stood the abbreviation "o.k." next to the words "all correct." Much like the modern-day world filled with text-friendly shortcuts such as LOL and OMG, an abbreviation craze swept nineteenth-century America, although with a twist. In an attempt at humor, young, educated elites deliberately misspelled words and abbreviated them for slang. For example, "KG" stood for "know go," the incorrect spelling of "no go." The joke is lost on us today, but it was LOL funny in the 1800s.**

**So when "o.k." appeared in print, it was intended to be the shortening of "oll korrekt," the humorous misspelling of "all correct." According to Allan Metcalf, author of *OK: The Improbable Story of America's Greatest Word*, Boston Morning Post editor Charles Gordon Greene, who often wrote witticisms and took shots at other broadsheets in print, was likely the author of the attack on the Providence newspaper and thus the man who gave birth to OK.**
